More Than a Word of Comfort

As Canada mourns the loss of soldiers killed in Afghanistan, military chaplains are called upon to provide comfort and counselling to grieving family members. In June, Lutheran Church—Canada chaplain, Captain Jason Kouri was assigned to provide pastoral care to the family of Cpl. Martin Dubé including assisting at the ceremonies held at CFB Trenton when the body was brought home.

In Trenton, Pastor Kouri had a time of prayer before the ramp ceremony. Colonels, generals, the minister of defence and the Governor General were present. Pastor Kouri took the initiative to share the Gospel with the bereaved and the VIPs. His Trinitarian invocation, prayers and Christ-centred preaching applied to the situation were appreciated, and Governor General Michaëlle Jean specifically expressed her appreciation for his initiative. She addressed Padre Kouri (one does not normally address her Excellency directly), requesting that his superiors be asked to repeat this devotional time when possible at Trenton whenever one of Canada's fallen soldiers is brought home. The Governor General apparently expressed the desire that other chaplains offer the same kind of care.

Due to his faithful service and testimony, Padre Kouri may be partly responsible for a new ministry to the families of Canada's fallen soldiers.

Two new reserve chaplains, Rev. Sye VanMaanen and Rev. Tom Korcok have recently completed training with the Canadian Forces.

The international headquarters of Canadian Lutheran World Relief (CLWR) will move to Portage Place Mall in downtown Winnipeg. July 1, 2009. The new address is 302-393 Portage Avenue, Winnipeg, MB, R3B 3H6.

CLWR is leasing surplus space from the ELCIC. Renovations to the space are complete and the agency is set for the move.

For the time being, the Four Corners alternative trade program and the commodities operation will remain on Kingsbury Avenue. This property has been sold and must be vacated by the end of July. A new location for Four Corners and commodities is being finalized.

With summer coming to a close, we once again get back into the routine making plans for our church programs for the upcoming year. Our LWML-C of BSLC is no exception. On Tuesday, September 8th at 7:00, all women of our congregation are invited to attend our LWML-C meeting. We have meetings on the first Tuesday of every month from September to June. Those ladies who are not members, are most welcome to join us, both to learn what LWML is all about and for an evening of fellowship. We have an exciting program planned for this year, full of interesting speakers and mission projects.

Our motto which describes who we are and what we do is "Called to Serve," based on Deuteronomy 10:12, "And now, O Israel, what does the LORD your God ask of you but to fear the LORD your God, to walk in all his ways, to love him, to serve the LORD your God with all your heart and with all your soul."

To correspond with the beginning of the school year, we are once again working on the CLWR School Kits-We Care mission project. These kits are made up of things that brighten a student's life, where school supplies are scare.

Kit items include: 3 notebooks (approx 8" x 10" – 20.3 x 25.4 cm) – not coiled, 32 pages.

1 ruler (12"/metric), 1 pencil sharpener, 1 eraser,

6 unsharpened pencils with erasers and 1 pack of 12 or 16 pencil crayons.

We ask that these kit requirements be followed, so each child receives the same school supplies and to ensure the cost of shipping is covered. Suggested donation for each kit is \$5, which pays for a We Care bag/backpack (to be used as a school bag) and shipping of the kits overseas.

We are again collecting drink can tabs for a specialized wheelchair for Emma. Emma is 7 years old, a Grade 2 student at Shevchenko School in Vita, Manitoba and has cerebral palsy. She is a delightful, young girl, who loves school, loves the water, enjoys camping, and likes dogs, cats and horses.

We will be celebrating LWML-Canada Sunday on October 4th, based on the "Shine Like Stars in Our Community and the World" theme.

For the October 6th meeting, we have invited Karen Van Leudsen as our guest speaker from Osborne House. Osborne House provides shelter to women and their children from all backgrounds, who are victims of domestic violence. Their programs include advocacy, shelter, crisis intervention, in-house support groups, a province wide 24-hour crisis line, follow-up/outreach program, individual counselling and education. Through a variety of means they work to equip women with the information they need to make healthy decisions and remain free from abuse.

Our society is hosting the Zone's Fall Renewal on October 17th, from 9:00 am – 3:00 pm. Cost is \$8, which includes lunch. This year's theme is "Raise a Child In The Lord", with guest speaker, Jennifer McCrea, principal from our school speaking on "Teaching Children in a Christian Setting."

We are scheduled to volunteer for the food program at Siloam Mission, to help serve lunch on November 7^{th} , 11:30-2:30. Those that have joined us in the past have found this to be a positive, personally rewarding experience. Those interested in helping, please sign up.
